What is Trampolining ?

It is fun and exercise obtained from bouncing up and down, forward and backward, round and round on the centre of a tight but resilient nylon sheet stretched between a steel frame and supported by elastic or steel springs.

This enables you to jump higher than ever before, remain in the air longer giving more time to perform, extend and combine in difficulty all the conventional leaps, turns, twists and somersaults.

It also permits bouncing, rolling, twisting, landing and taking off with continuous rebounds from the feet, knees, seat, back, front, hands and knees. These actions only being limited by the performer's stamina and practice.

It is an activity for all ages and both sexes.

It gives physically handicapped people the chance to enjoy the power and exhilaration of jumping, falling and rebounding without injury.

It is an intensive conditioning exercise which makes strong demands on the circulation and respiration necessitating practice in short spells only.

It offers a range and complexity of movement combinations to challenge even the most endowed and accomplished gymnast.

It is an officially recognised physical education activity.

It is a competitive event and a sport in its own right.

It is a means of practising diving skills without the need to get wet or even be able to swim.

Finally it is easy to learn, straightforward to teach, difficult to master completely and almost hopeless to give up.

TRAMPOLINE RULES IN SUMMARY:

1. There shall be one compulsory and one optional routine.
2. The ten best competitors then repeat their optional for the final.
2. The starting order is determined by a draw.
3. A routine shall consist of ten bounces.
4. The compulsory routine cannot be repeated.
5. Only 2 skills can be repeated in the optional routine.
6. The judges score shall not exceed ten points.
7. Each jump is assigned a degree of difficulty.
8. Each of the four judges shall flash their score, thihg and low scores are discarded, the middle two scores are added together and averaged.
9. The total average score is added to the degree of difficulty and the competitor with the highest score wins.

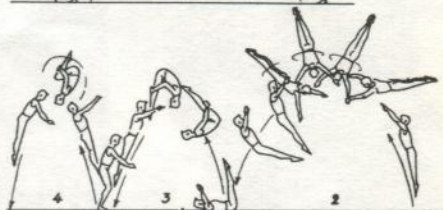

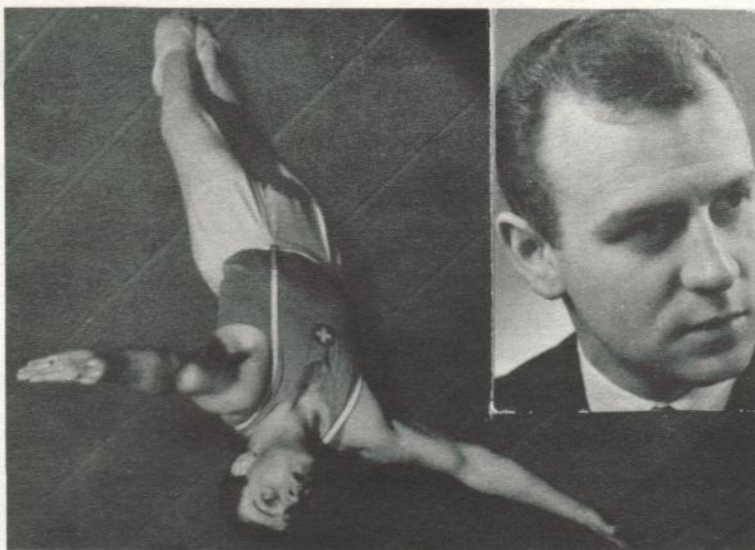

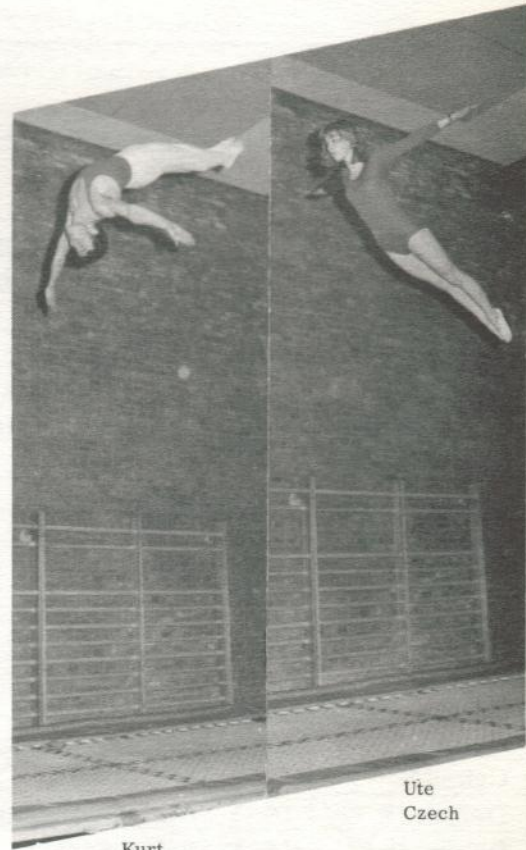
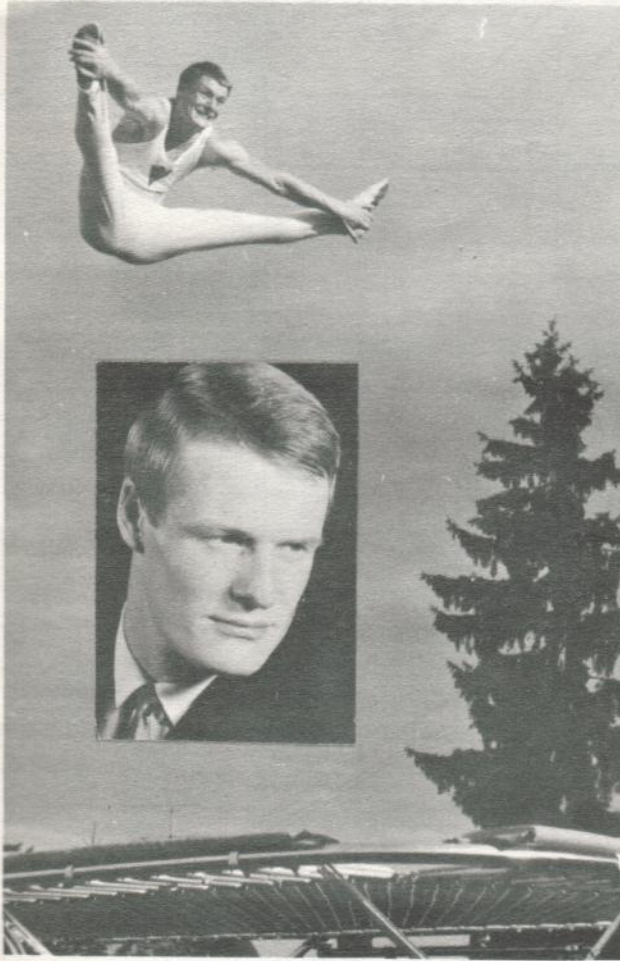

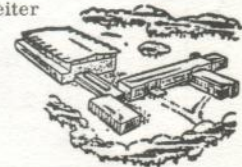
